

Szakmai beszámoló
Dr. Magyar-Hárshegyi Piroska részt vételéről
a 31. *Rei Cretariae Romanae Fautorum* konferencián

Alulírott Dr. Magyar-Hárshegyi Piroska a Budapesti Történeti Múzeum Aquincumi Múzeuma Ókortörténeti Főosztályának területfelelős régész, főmuzeológus munkatársa 2018. szeptember 23-28. között részt vett a 31. *Rei Cretariae Romanae Fautorum* c. vándorkonferencián, amely ez alkalommal Cluj-Napocaban (Románia) került megrendezésre. Ezen a kétévente zajló nemzetközi konferencián, amelynek a római kori kerámiakutatás és kereskedeleml friss eredményeinek bemutatása a fókusza, részt vételemet a Nemzeti Kulturális Alap A2018/N3013 sz. pályázatomra megítélt 70.000 forinttal támogatta. Ez az összeg a részvételi díjat (220 Euro) fedezte.

Az idei konferenciát a National Museum of Transylvanian History rendezte Dr. Viorica Rusu-Bolindeş vezetésével, a Babeş-Bolyai University, valamint az Institute of Archaeology and History of Art of the Romanian Academy; a County Museum of History and art, Zalau; a „1st Decembrie 1918” University of Alba Iulia és a National Museum of Unification, Alba Iulia bevonásával. Jelen konferencián kb. 60 poszter volt megtékinthető a találkozó teljes ideje alatt és 57 előadást hallgathattunk meg kolozsvári, zilahi és gyulafehérvári helyszíneken.

Jelen konferencián angol nyelvű előadással vett részt, amelyet 2018. szeptember 24-én tartottunk meg Prof. Gabler Dénessel közösen (MTA-BTKI Régészeti Intézet), „*Households of the Roman urban élite in Aquincum (Folyamőr str., Budapest). Imported and local pottery*” címmel. Az előadás az aquincumi katonavárosban az 1970-es-80-as években Wellner István, Parragi Györgyi és Szirmai Krisztina régésztek által feltárt, gazdag díszített római városi villa kerámialeleteit mutatta be és helyezte kontextusba az egyes építési periódusok segítségével. Külön hangsúlyt kapott előadásunkban az egykor importált, a Római Birodalom más tartományainak érkező kerámialeletek és az esetlegesen ebben szállított élelmiszerek és italok bemutatása; valamint több esetben ezek helyi készítésű másolatainak, vagy az ezektől inspirált új edényeknek az elemzése.



A fent ismertetett előadás a 46. RCRF Acta-kötetben, várhatóan 2019-ben – amely kiemelkedően fontos publikálási lehetőség mindannyiunk számára - fog nyomtatásban megjelenni.








Proportions of the different type of pottery

(1925 frgs.)





AMPHORAE from the site of the luxurious building complex (54 fr.)











Italian and South Gaulish Samian
from the Folyamőr street






The distribution of the late Italian *sigillata* in the Middle Danubian provinces.

23. The locations of the military forts of Óbuda (Aquincum)











Proportion of the Samian from the different workshops in the Folyamőr street





Westerndorf sigillata


Pfaffenhofen and Moesian Pottery from the Folyamőr street




North African Red Slip Ware from the Folyamőr street and
distribution of contemporaneous North African pottery in the area of Aquincum






